Manager Greg Gatenby TORONTO . . . The winner of the 1993 Lionel Gelber Prize was announced last night at the start of the International Festival of Authors in Toronto. Kanan Makiya's passionate call for a protest against cruelty in the Arab world, entitled *Cruelty and Silence*, is the winner of the \$50,000 Prize.

Makiya, who was born and raised in Iraq, is the author of two previous books, *Republic of Fear* and *The Monument*, both published under the pseudonym Samir Al-Khalil, out of concern for his safety. *Cruelty and Silence*, hailed as "a brave book" by *The Globe and Mail*, is the first that appears under his own name.

"Disturbing revelations . . . are the strength of Mr. Makiya's *Cruelty and Silence* . . . Mr Makiya gives us almost cinematic glimpses of cruelty and suffering," commented the *New York Times Review of Books*.

In accepting the award, Makiya hailed the witnesses and victims whose suffering makes up the first part of *Cruelty and Silence*, and declared that "the outcome, which the Lionel Gelber Foundation has honoured with its award tonight, belongs to those witnesses and victims at least as much as it belongs to me. In a small but important way, the singling out of *Cruelty and Silence* for this award is an act of acknowledgement - an act of recognition for what the book's real heroes have suffered."

In his speech, as in the book, Makiya went on to call for a protest against cruelty among the Arab nations, and deplored the silence of Arab intelligensia. "Cruelty thrives on such silence," he pointed out. He concluded by calling for a new generation of Arabs to begin to think in a new way.

This year's jury was chaired by Professor Denis Smith, Professor of Political Science at the University of Western Ontario. The other jurors were Dr. Thomas Axworthy, Executive Director of the CRB Foundation, Jane Barrett, Librarian at the Canadian Institute of International Affairs, Professor Linda B. Miller, of the Department of Political Science at Wellesley College, and Christopher Young, former editor of the *Ottawa Citizen* who now writes a syndicated column for Southam newspapers.

**Manager** Greg Gatenby TORONTO... The winner of the 1992 Lionel Gelber Prize was announced last night at the kickoff of the International Festival of Authors in Toronto. David McCullough's full-scale biography, <u>Truman</u>, published by Simon & Schuster, has won him the \$50,000 Prize, which is given annually for the best book published in English on the subject of international relations.

In choosing the winner, the jury cited the book as "a scholarly, well written, highly readable, indeed fascinating biography of a man who had a great impact on world affairs at a crucial time. . . [His acheivements are] covered magnificently in what one of the jurors described as a 'blockbuster book."

The book, ten years in the making, has been called "captivating . . . the principal achievement of this biography - the most thorough account of Truman's life yet to appear - is its honest and revealing portrait of the 'ordinary' man who became an extraordinary political figure," (New York Times Book Review), "biography as good as it gets," (People) and "After Truman's death, reporter Mary McGrory wrote that he had 'proved that the ordinary American is capable of grandeur.' Here, after 10 years of meticulous scholarship, is a book to match that triumph." - (Washington Book World)

David McCullough is known to television audiences as the host of <u>The Civil</u> War, <u>The American Experience</u> and <u>LBJ</u>, and is the author of five other books of history and biography. He has won the New York Public Library's Literary Lion Award, the Cornelius Ryan Award and two National Book Awards. <u>Truman</u>, for which McCullough was awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship, has also been nominated for this year's National Book Award.

In accepting the award, McCullough remarked on the importance of Harry Truman as a man, and a historic figure. "Candidates claiming they <u>are</u> Truman reminds us of how important we still feel his kind of courage and integrity are in political leadership." He went on to thank the committee, and to note "how proud, grateful and honoured I am, particularly when I look at the other books on the short list."

The Lionel Gelber Prize, established in 1989 by the late Lionel Gelber, was presented by the writer's brother Arthur Gelber and Dr. James Gibson, chairman of the Prize committee.

## RECORD NUMBER OF BOOKS COMPETE FOR NORTH AMERICA'S RICHEST BOOK PRIZE

As word of the Lionel Gelber Prize spreads internationally, publishers have entered a record number of titles for the \$50,000 prize, the richest book prize in North America. The prize, established in 1989, is given annually to the author of the best book on the subject of international relations published in English or in English translation. It has attracted 53 eligible entries this year, up from 35 last year.

Last year's winner was David McCullough, whose book <u>Truman</u> (General Publishing) went on to win the Pulitzer Prize. A number of biographies of world leaders from Lester B. Pearson to Richard Nixon are also on the slate this year. Other books explore twentieth century history from a variety of perspectives, examine political thought and theory, or look toward the future.

Six titles (comprising a short list of those eligible for the Prize) will be announced in mid-September. The winning book will be announced as part of the major Literary Awards presented on October 13, 1993, the opening night of the 14th annual International Festival of Authors at Harbourfront Centre in Toronto.

"I'm gratified to see that we are receiving more books in translation than we have in the past," commented Prize Manager Greg Gatenby. "The jury members have a busy summer ahead of them, with 50% more reading to do, but they are delighted at the increasing interest in the Prize."

## **BOOK ON ETHICS IN INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS WINS** \$50,000

TORONTO...The winner of the \$50,000 Lionel Gelber Prize was announced today at a luncheon ceremony. This year's winner is Dorothy V. Jones for her book <u>Code of Peace: Ethics and Security in the World of the Warlord States</u>, published by the University of Chicago Press.

On receiving the prize, Dr. Jones remarked, "Lionel Gelber pointed out that 'International relations and global politics have an impact on all of us,' and he noted that the question was not whether there should be power in the world but, rather, who would have it. In one sense, <u>Code of Peace</u> is an account of the struggle to contain, control, and channel that power in order to create an international system in which states and individual human beings can live in peace".

In <u>Code of Peace</u>, Dr. Jones examines the question of whether, in a diverse world, nations can find a common ethical framework that can guide the conduct of international relations. She argues that such a code is in fact evolving with each new treaty and agreement. In her introduction to the book, Dr. Jones notes that the commonest reaction to the notion of ethics in international affairs is "skepticism, followed by a barrage of questions that add up to various polite forms of 'Are you kidding?'"

<u>Code of Peace</u> is the result of Dr. Jones' work as a Social Science Research Council/MacArthur Foundation Fellow in International Peace and Security. She is currently a research associate of the Newberry Library in Chicago, and is the author of two other books on diplomacy.



#### \$50,000 BOOK PRIZE AWARDED TO MICHAEL IGNATIEFF

**Toronto** ... The winner of the 1994 **Lionel Gelber Prize** was announced last night at the Literary Awards Ceremony of the International Festival of Authors at Harbourfront. 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# WINNER OF PREMIER LIONEL GELBER (\$50,000 CDN) LITERARY PRIZE ANNOUNCED

Jonathan D. Spence, author of the bestselling *The Search for Modern China*, today, during the closing ceremony of the International Festival of Authors, was awarded the **first Lionel Gelber Literary Prize** consisting of a work of art and \$50,000 (Cdn) in cash. The Prize, one of the largest of its kind in the world, was established as one of the last public acts of Canadian writer, historian and advisor on international affairs, Lionel Gelber. Deeply committed to increasing public awareness of global issues of war and peace, Lionel Gelber envisioned the prize as a stimulus to authors writing about international affairs. It is awarded to the author of the year's best book on international relations available in English, in Canada, during the calendar year.

The Search for Modern China, a work of unsurpassed learning, imagination and passion, is the story of four centuries of Chinese history, from the end of the once-glorious Ming dynasty to Deng Xiaoping's bloody suppression of the pro-democracy demonstrations in Tiananmen Square. Through the ideas and emotions of its reformist Confucian scholars, its poets, novelists, artists and visionary students, the story unfolds of one of the world's oldest cultures struggling to define itself as Chinese and modern.

Jonathan D. Spence is George Burton Adams Professor of History at Yale University. He was named a MacArthur Fellow in 1988. Born in England in 1936, he was educated at Winchester College and Cambridge University and received a Ph.D. in history from Yale in 1965.
